Lesson 9: Raising Godly Children in an Ungodly World. Part 1

- I. Get past behavior to see the heart. Proverbs 4:23 | Mark 7:21
 - A. The basic issue is not a child's behavior, it is his/her heart from which that behavior flows.
 - 1. Behavior can be irritating and thus command attention; however, we must not be content with merely addressing nuisances.
 - 2. Two children are fighting over a toy (an irritating behavior). The question is posed, "who had the toy first?" This corrective, though, misses the heart and makes the issue solely a matter of justice. However, when we look at the situation as a heart issue, we may find that we have two heart problems manifesting themselves. Both children are operating selfishly. Neither children is concerned with anything other than their own happiness.
 - 3. All sinful behavior is linked to a sinful heart.
 - B. Since all sinful behavior flows from sinful hearts, parents must learn to shepherd their children's hearts.
 - 1. You must help your children see themselves as sinners in need of God's grace.
 - 2. You must help your children see that nothing short of Christ can satisfy their souls.
- II. Parents must provide structure to shape their children.
 - A. Your children will become a product not only of their life experiences, but how they interact with those experiences.
 - B. Shaping influences a child can have: (note: these are not exhaustive lists)
 - 1. Family Life
 - a. nuclear family
 - b. how many children
 - c. Personality
 - 2. Family Values
 - a. What is important to the parents?
 - b. How do the parents handle stress?
 - c. Philosophies
 - d. How seriously does the family take their faith?
 - 3. Family Roles
 - a. Are both parents engaged?
 - b. Are both parents lovingly involved?
 - 4. Family Conflict Resolution
 - a. Does the family know how to talk about their problems?
 - b. Does the family resolve things?
 - c. Are problems handled in a biblical manner?
 - 5. Family Response to Failure
 - a. Are children made to feel like fools when they fail?
 - b. Does the family find amusement at the shortcomings of the children?
 - 6. Family History/Stability
 - a. Births/deaths
 - b. Divorce/remarriage

- c. Frequent moving
- d. Poverty
- C. It is a mistake to view shaping influences in either a deterministic way or to deny that they have any effects on children.
 - 1. Your parenting and home life matter!
 - 2. There is grace for our failure!
 - 3. Don't fall into the trap of being deterministic.
 - a. "If I can control the environment enough (protect/shelter) then they will turn out ok."
 - b. This thinking fails to account for the heart.
- D. Children are not merely passive receivers of shaping; they are responding actively.
 - 1. Therefore, you must take their heart into account.
- III. Parents must orient their children toward God. Proverbs 9:7-10
 - A. A child's Godward orientation determines their response to shaping influences.
 - B. Your child either is actively worshipping God or something less. (Romans 1:18-19)
 - 1. A child may not be conscious of their orientation, but their heart is never neutral.
 - 2. Modern idols may not be made of wood or stone, they are more likely to be idols of the heart that manifest as:
 - a. Fear of man
 - b. Lust
 - c. Pride
 - d. Evil desires
 - 3. Note: all of the above issues flow from a child's fundamental beliefs about life.
 - 4. The question is not, "will our children worship?" It is "Whom do they worship?"

Conclusion:

- Your children are not neutral beings.
- It is your responsibility to structure their lives biblically.
- It is your responsibility to orient your children towards God.
